Cum Laude

Qualifications for Cum Laude status at GHS

- Earn at least 26 credits.
- Earn a 3.8 GPA or higher
 - Cum Laude: 3.8 GPA with successful completion of at least 1 Advanced Placement course.
 - Magna Cum Laude: 4.0 GPA with successful completion of at least 3 Advanced Placement courses.
 - Summa Cum Laude: 4.2 GPA or higher with successful completion of at least 5 Advanced Placement courses.
- No academic integrity violations.
- Perform a minimum of 60 community service/volunteer hours.
- Participate in a co-curricular for a minimum of 3 years during high school.

ACT Test Score:

- College admittance
- Scholarships
- Trade unions

Another opportunity: October 17th



ACT

- Accepted by all colleges and universities
- Tests four areas: English, Math, Science, and Reading
- Maximum score 36.0
- "Optional" writing assessment is strongly recommended
- Student registers at: <u>www.actstudent.org</u>
- Cost: \$68 / \$93.00 for plus writing
- Maximum of 4 colleges can be chosen to receive score.
- At your cost, may take the ACT multiple times (up to 12); highest score will be used for university decision.

PSAT

- "Pre-SAT"
- National Merit Scholarship screener
- Targeted at top 20% of academic class (optional)
- Watch for email regarding sign up-October

SAT

- May be required for admission to colleges in other regions
- Tests Verbal, Math, and Writing Skills
- Maximum score is composite of 800 on each of the subtests / Max 1600

- 2024 AP EXAMS will be held May 6th- May 17th
- Schedule is on www.collegeboard.com
- Exam cost: \$98.00
- Exam registration: Fall 2023
- Study tools available online
- Transferable credit is determined by each university or college
- Exams are scored 1 (Low) through 5 (High)
- Scores must be reported directly to the university from College Board
- Colleges typically accept scores of 3 or higher

Building Blocks for the Future


Junior Year

- Maintain good grades.
- Take more classes according to your interests.
- Consider PSAT during the first semester.
- Individual parent/student meeting with counselor.
- □ Take the ACT during second semester.
- Keep record of all activities for applications.
- Start looking at and visiting colleges.
- Research grade and class requirements.
- Begin determining a specific occupation.

Building Blocks for the Future


Senior Year

- Maintain good grades.
- Retake the ACT (Sept./Oct) if you think you can improve your score.
- Apply to colleges before November holidays.
- Apply for scholarships.
- Apply for financial aid.
- Finalize your plan by May 1.



Checklist for Parents

- Continue to encourage your student to take challenging high school courses. (to strengthen transcript)
- Provide a consistent and distraction free study setting in the home.
- Explore careers, colleges, and life after high school with your student.
